How to write a discussion post

Critical posts:

- 1. Pick some idea in the reading that you find interesting or confusing. You don't need to be 100% clear on what the author is saying.
- 2. Write a short paragraph (50-100 words) explaining the idea. This should be a **brief** summary of the idea; you do not need to introduce the reading or the background.
- 3. Write a second paragraph (around 100 words) explaining what you find interesting about that particular idea.
- 4. Write a third paragraph (around 100 words) giving your own thoughts on the topic. Anyone reading this paragraph should be able to figure out exactly what you think. Use the first person freely.

Clarificatory posts:

- 1. Pick some idea in the reading that you find confusing.
- 2. Write a short paragraph (50-100 words) summarizing the idea as best you can.
- 3. Write a second paragraph (around 100 words) explaining **why** you find the idea confusing. Is it because you don't know what a technical term means? Is it because you think the author is contradicting something they said earlier? Is it because you think something is very counterintuitive?
- 4. Write a third paragraph (50-100 words) explaining why you think this matters. Does this ambiguity undermine some idea that they are presenting? Is their idea so counterintuitive that we should reject the entire theory?

Rubric

These are the components of your posts that I will be looking at. If you ever want to know why you received the grade that you received, you should set up an appointment with me during my office hours to discuss it.
